OUR TOWN - Brantford. The program was broadcast on WNED at 6:30 pm on Saturday December 12th, 2009. I think that every home in Brantford was tuned in to this one. It turned out later that some of the homes did not get good reception for the first segment which contained the clubs stuff but Keith should have copies available soon?

Along with about twenty-five other local video enthusiasts, Brant club members Dan Kennaley, Randy Hincks, Terry Kittridge, Keith Gloster and Joan Jacquemain each accepted an assignment to provide footage for the final production. Local sites covered by the club group included the Brantford walking trail system, the venerable CNR railroad station and the Sanderson Center for performing arts.

The shooting was done in October 2009. In keeping with the "Our Town" series on PBS the volunteers were asked to shoot on a tape provided by WNED and then return it to them for editing.

Next up for our delectation was the result of a tour by Ken & Iris Davy to Kiwi land, or as it is better known, New Zealand. Titled "NEW ZEALAND CRUISE" the production was an informative, beautifully shot tour through the coast of the Kiwi homeland. It must be the clean sea air down there but I thought that the images were spectacular and not needing of any HD. More on that later. Coming in at a lengthy 20 minutes the production held interest and the information imparted later drew several questions and comments from the

assembled mass. The audio was good but now we have to get Ken to do something about the graphics and far more important.... come up with some really good titles for his production. Something like "Cruising Upside Down on the Earth" or "Trippin' in the big Maori Canoe" - you get the idea. But then again, maybe Ken was just paying homage and being unoriginal, like the Kiwis.... Rick Doelle took the third spot of the evening with his "ROCK-A-BYE-BABY" production. At a mere one and a half minutes Rick entertained us with more footage from the depths of the sea around Belize. Rick's sense of humour is coming out with the titles he gives his films. It leaves the audience wondering where he is going until they see the main part of his thoughts. First the Bicycle Gang threw us for a loop and now the Baby surprise. Using the well known tune "Rock-a-bye-Baby" as the music track we were treated to the tender stroking and petting of a Nurse shark at about 25 ft under the warm Caribbean. Gets a chuckle every time. We had information about all kinds of stuff and questions and comments before we rounded off the evenings films with a work in progress by the "Where Consortium" of Jonathan Garfield, Andrea Bakai, Paul Benson and Alex Szatmary. Titled "WHERE'S BARRON?" it was a series of mock interviews and graphics of quotes by various famous people. We look forward to the finished product.

For the second half of the evening your moderator, Jon Soyka, ended his run at the front of the room by inviting John Cook, Nestor Rosa, Fred Briggs and Dan Copeland along with many others in the group to make their thoughts and feelings about the club moving on to High Definition equipment for viewing what we produce. As expected it drew many varied comments and opinions and thoughts and kudos and critiques. The crux of the matter is are we a technically oriented club in which the best technical products are needed to show the DVD's to their best advantage or are we a content based club in which the story and content of the productions trump any technical priorities.

Arguments were presented in a civil and orderly manner with each side more or less acknowledging the others sides ideas. The result was more or less expected.

At the monthly meeting the following Thursday the HV/FM executive voted to look into the purchase of a High Definition projector and a Blu-Ray player along with all of the necessary accourrements. It was decided to leave the audio at the stereo setting at the moment but in the near future we may go to 5.1 or even maybe 7.1 sound. I of course voted to wait until we could purchase a 27.3 surround sound Ultra-High Definition 3D Holographic projector and player with attached coffee maker and Pez dispenser. If all goes according to the proposed schedule we could have a system in place for the February or March meeting.




Sandi Whithouse (left) and Jack Simpson (right) have somehow missed that Keith Gloster is wearing at hat in the legion.

With the convergence of digital imaging technology, they intend to plan the programming to accommodate both serious still photographers as well as videographers, and noticed in only four months... "we are now seeing still photographers adding video content and videographers including slide shows in their videos! It seems to be a happy compromise."
